The universities

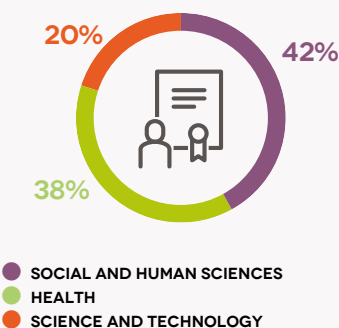
Theoretical and scientific education

Spread throughout the Wallonia-Brussels Federation territory, the French-speaking universities of Belgium offer their students quality education, which is divided up into four fields of study: science and technology, human sciences, health sciences and art.

Research at the heart of the French-speaking Belgian curriculum

In addition to an in-depth knowledge of the chosen subject, the universities of the Wallonia-Brussels Federation offer a solid general education, encouraging their students to take a scientific approach. This is why the focus is firmly on research, both basic and applied. This philosophy made the universities of French-speaking Belgium institutions that are famous for the excellence of their research programmes and that have earned a remarkable reputation both in our country and beyond.

Percentage of international students enrolled in a master's programme in university colleges by field of study

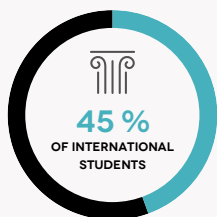


The university colleges

A practical and professionalising education

All the French-speaking university colleges of Belgium offer a quality education, which is closely linked to applied research, universities, and socio-professional environments. Contrary to universities, the teaching method adopted in university colleges is focused on the student and the work environment. The theoretical and conceptual aspects are nevertheless part of the programme, and a heavy focus is put on internships, which are mandatory. If you are looking for courses delivered in small lecture halls with regular work and practice, then a university college is what you need!

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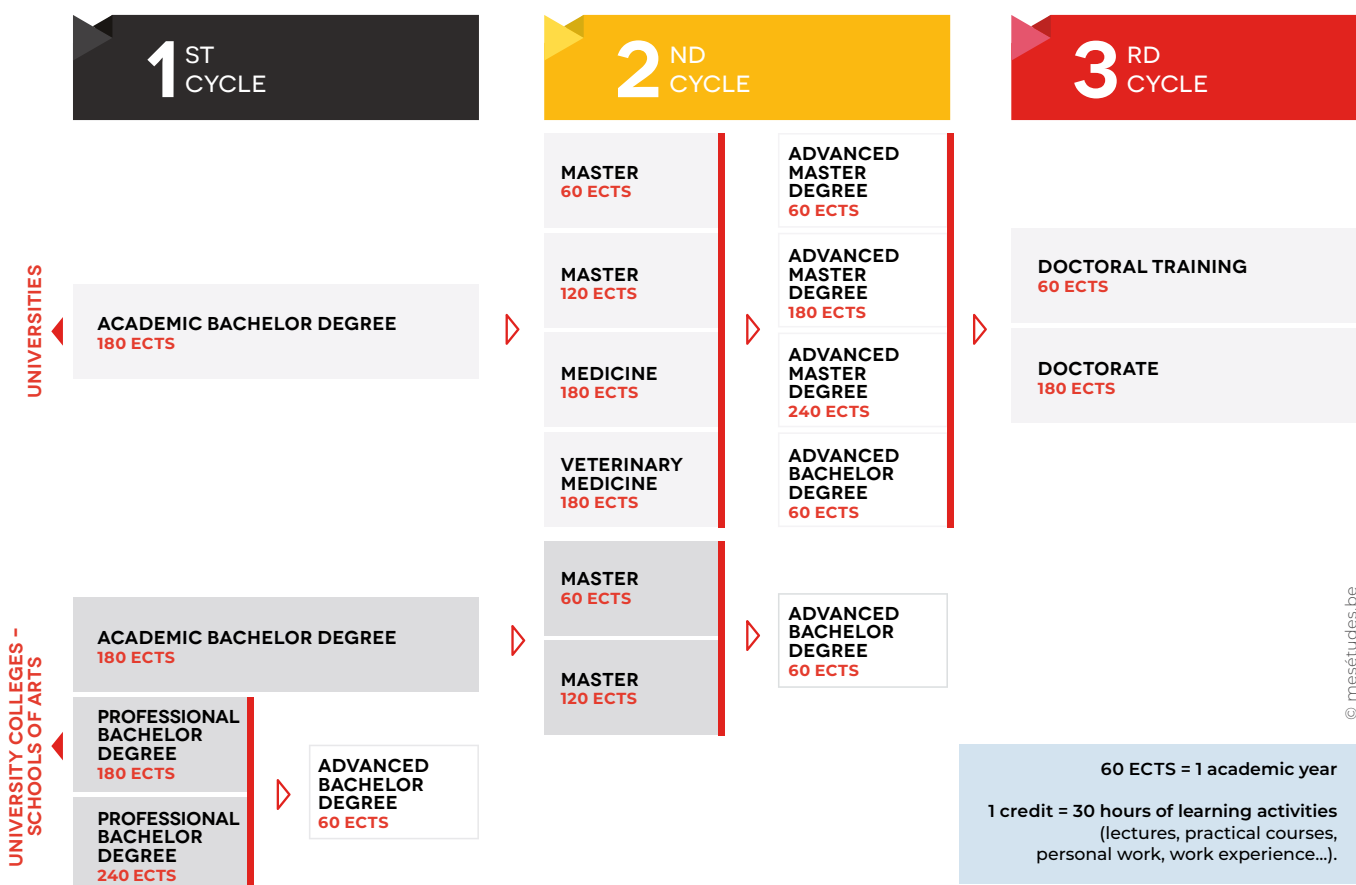

BELGIAN DEGREES RECOGNISED IN ALL EUROPE

In French-speaking Belgium, higher education is based on a system of three study cycles: the bachelor, the master and the doctorate. Each degree obtained gives you ECTS. The European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS) is a tool for making studies and courses more transparent and it allows credits taken at one higher education institution to be counted towards a qualification studied for at another. ECTS represent learning based on defined learning outcomes and their associated workload. ECTS enhances the flexibility of study programmes, supports the planning, delivery and evaluation of higher education programmes, and aims to make education systems more comparable internationally. ECTS has been adopted by most of the European countries and is expanding worldwide.

How higher education works

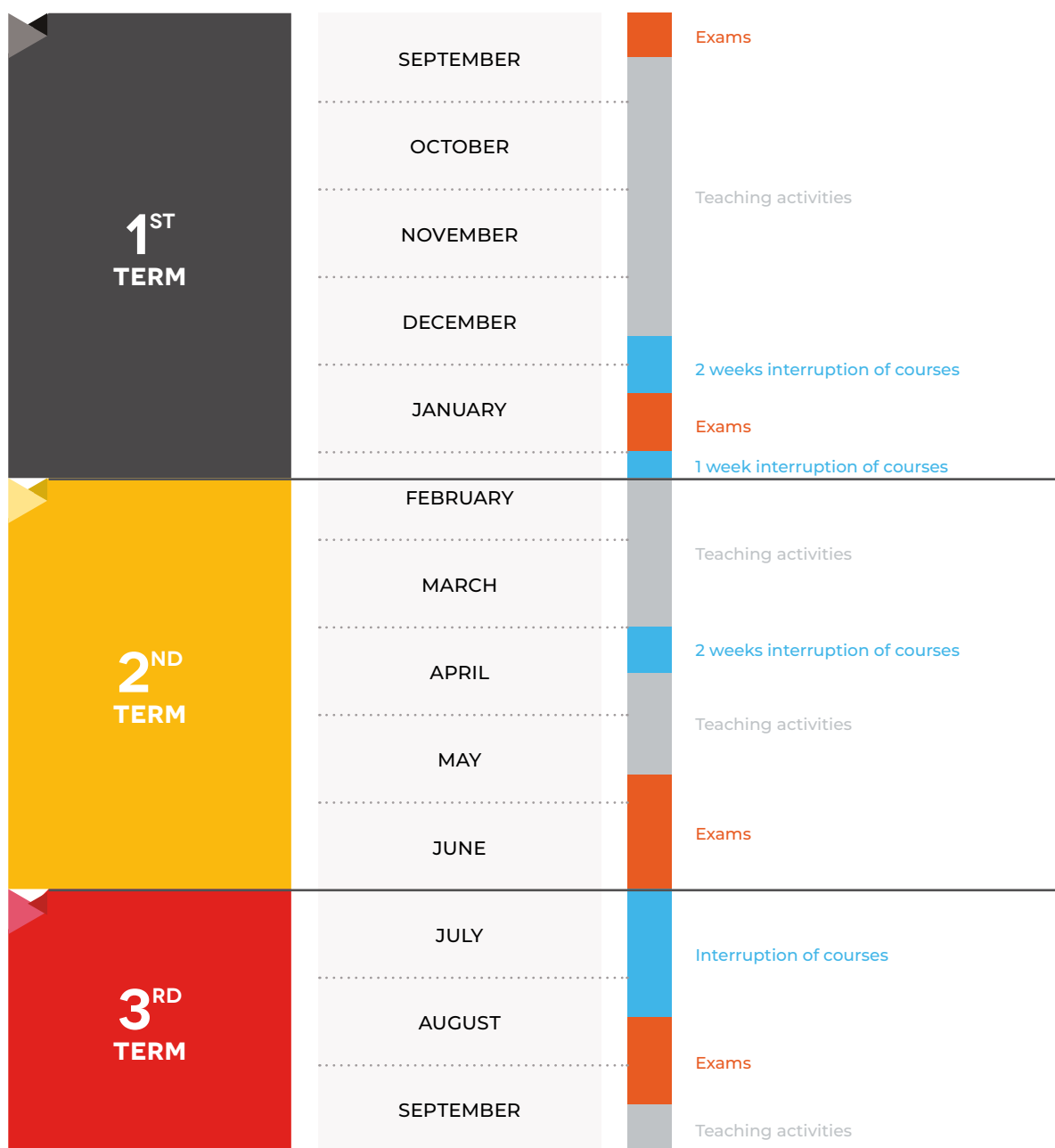


Graduation (bachelor's degree, master's degree and PhD) is linked to the number of years of studies completed since entering higher education. Each year can award up to 60 ECTS (European Credits Transfer System), which can be used and transferred from one country to another.

- The 1st cycle degree (bachelor's degree) represents 180 or 240 ECTS, namely 3 or 4 years of study.
- The 2nd cycle degree (master's degree) represents 60, 120 or 180 ECTS, namely 1, 2 or 3 years of study.
- The 3rd cycle degree (doctorate) represents a variable number of ECTS.

ACADEMIC CALENDAR

As a rule, the calendar of an academic year in French-speaking Belgium is divided up into three terms. Learning activities are split over the first two terms, except for some assessments or professional integration activities.

ADMISSION AND ENROLMENT PROCEDURES

Admission to bachelor's studies in the Wallonia-Brussels Federation

To follow a bachelor's curriculum, international students must hold a diploma that gives them access to the requested cycle and must pass the selection process required for some fields (civil engineering, medicine, dental sciences, veterinary medicine, speech therapy, physiotherapy and rehabilitation). Note that an equivalence of qualification application is required and must be filed with the [Service des Équivalences du Ministère de la Fédération Wallonie-Bruxelles](#).

Admission to master's studies

You must hold a bachelor's degree (1st cycle of 180 ECTS) in a field of study similar or identical to the one you wish to undertake. In most cases, an equivalence of your foreign higher education diploma is not required. The application to pursue further studies must be directly submitted to the [higher education institution](#) of your choice. It will then examine the comparability between your previous studies and the ones you want to pursue and will decide which study programme you are eligible for. It is also up to the institution to validate the credits obtained abroad in order to grant you any possible exemptions. It can also make decisions on requests for the recognition of prior professional or personal experience.



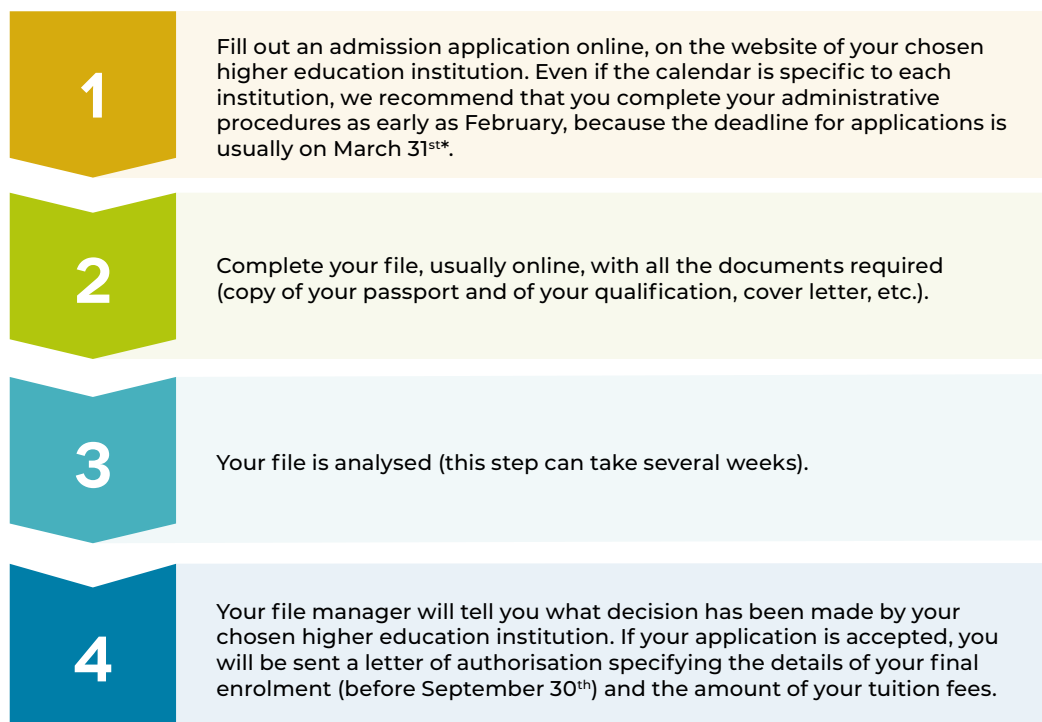

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* NB: You will need to have paid a €200 (+/-300 CAD) administrative fee to complete your online application. This amount will be deducted from your tuition fees if your application is accepted. The deposit will not be refunded in all other cases. It is therefore very important to check beforehand that you meet the access requirements.

Enrolment to master's studies is in 4 steps:



 **Please note:** There are specific admissions criteria for each master's degree and each higher education institution. Generally, these are listed on the presentation form of the masters, published on the institution's website.

Enrolment procedures for the doctorate

The first step is to check that you meet the requirements for accessing the doctorate. If these requirements are met, you can then complete the online application form of your chosen university.

Documents to include in your file:

- certificate of nationality dated within the calendar year of enrolment (or a copy of your passport);
- cover letter;
- thesis project;
- your supervisor's authorisation;
- 1st cycle and 2nd cycle degree certificates and transcripts (translated into French or English if necessary);
- proof of your activities over the last five years;
- a funding plan.

Always check the admission and enrolment conditions on the website of the university of your choice.

Conditions for access to the doctorate

Canadian students, as well as all non-EU nationals, need to meet the following conditions:



You must have obtained sufficiently good results in your prior studies:

- You must have a university master's degree of at least 300 ECTS;
- You must have an average of at least 70% during your 2nd study cycle.



You must provide a funding plan (official proof required) that demonstrates sufficient resources to complete your studies: €10,000 (±15,500 CAD) + tuition fees (currently €835 (±1,300 CAD)).

The doctorate corresponds to long-term studies, lasting at least three years. That's why it is important to find out about funding options.

The doctorate may be funded by:

- your own capital or a guarantor in Belgium;
- a grant from your government;
- a grant from the Belgian cooperation (ARES);
- a term as assistant to the university executive;
- a doctoral scholarship from the chosen university;
- income related to a research contract.



You must have a thesis proposal and the written agreement from a supervisor.

FUNDING POSSIBILITIES



How much does it cost to live in French-speaking Belgium?

Although the cost of living is relatively low in Belgium, it can vary from one town to another. Don't forget to consider everything (food, transport, free time, health, etc.) when preparing your budget, to avoid any unpleasant surprises. This means that, for a student, the cost of living may vary between €1000 (±1,500 CAD) and €1,200 (±1,800 CAD) per month and includes:

Accommodation	Between €300 et €500/month (±460 and 780 CAD)
Food	€400/month (±620 CAD)
Study material	€50/month (±80 CAD)
Healthcare and insurance	€30/month (±50 CAD)
Public transport	€50/month (±80 CAD)
Other (phone bill, going out, etc.)	€170/month (±260 CAD)



A high-quality education with tuition fees accessible to the greatest number of people

In French-speaking Belgium, access to higher education is a priority. This is why the Wallonia-Brussels Federation public institutions subsidise much of the cost of studying. This means that registration fees are fairly low, yet the quality of study is excellent.

The additional contribution

As a rule, tuition fees for studying at higher education institutions of the Wallonia-Brussels Federation will depend on the student's status:

- University students from Wallonia-Brussels Federation or European Union Member State nationals pay **maximum annual tuition fees of €835**.
- Colleges and school of art students from Wallonia-Brussels Federation or European Union Member State nationals pay annual tuition fees of:
 1. First and second year of bachelor: **€175.01**
 2. Third year of bachelor, diploma year: **€ 224.24**
 3. First year of master: **€350.03**
 4. Second year of master, diploma year: **€454.47**
- From the academic year 2025-2026, and in accordance with [ARES circular N°2025-001 of 18/02/2025](#), **all students of non-EU nationality**, with the exception of students covered by the exemptions listed on www.studyinbelgium.be, will be required to pay registration fees and an additional contribution (€4,175) each year, i.e. a total of **€5,010** for universities and **between €4,350 and €4,629,47** for colleges and school of arts.

Grants, listed at www.studyinbelgium.be, are available depending on your nationality and the level of studies you wish to pursue.



Did you know that...

Numerous **agreements** were signed between the Wallonia-Brussels Federation and Canadian Provinces, especially with Quebec, Ontario and Acadia. wallonie-bruxelles.ca/fr/rerelations-entre-le-canada-et-wallonie-bruxelles

Grants for students and (future) French teachers from New Brunswick, Acadia and Ontario are available. The aim of these grants is to provide the opportunity to participate in **advanced French language training courses to become familiar with teaching French**, during summer in the Wallonia-Brussels Federation. wallonie-bruxelles.ca/fr/bourses-et-financement-0

Since 2024, Canada has been an associated country in pillar II of the **Horizon Europe programme**, which funds collaborative research projects in various fields. Canadian researchers and organisations can now participate in the programme alongside their EU-counterparts.



Wallonia-Brussels International also offers grants, for which Canadian students are eligible, for study periods in the 2nd and 3rd cycle:



- **IN WBI excellence grants programme**

Wallonia-Brussels International (WBI) set up this grants programme to welcome researchers who want to carry out a postdoctoral programme within higher education institutions organised or subsidised by the Wallonia-Brussels Federation. Available grants can be either long-term (at least 1 year, renewable once) or short-term.



- **Master IN grants**

The Master IN grants programme, in which Canada is one of the priority countries, is for international students who would like to pursue a master's degree in Wallonia or Brussels and who hold at least a bachelor's degree from a foreign institution recognised by the higher education authorities in the applicant's country. Applications must be submitted to the Walloon or Brussels higher education institution.

WORKING WHILE STUDYING

In Belgium, all foreign students can work while studying. The only conditions are: they must be enrolled in a higher education institution in the Wallonia-Brussels Federation and must have a valid residence permit.

Work time:

- During school holidays (winter, spring, summer – July, August, September): students can work with no hour limit.
- During the academic year: students can work no more than 20 hours a week and the work must be compatible with the studies.

After completing their studies in Belgium, third-country nationals may apply for an authorisation to extend their stay for a maximum of 12 months to find a job or set up a business to obtain a residence permit for work purposes.

STUDENTS SUPPORT

DID YOU KNOW THAT...

In the Wallonia-Brussels Federation, student accommodations (in a student residence or in privately-owned community apartments) are called “**kots**”. There even exist “**kots à projet**” for students who would like to work together on a project they care about. Each kot-à-projet focuses on a specific area related to culture, humanitarian or social aid, sports, or environmental protection, and organises activities for other students or locals.



Social assistance

Each university has a social service, which listens to students and can give them advice and guidance through various procedures. Some universities also have an assistance service for foreign students. Ask your institution's social service about the different existing types of assistance.



Student cards



Cinema, theatre, museum, gym membership, etc. The student card issued by your institution offers you numerous discounts within and outside its walls.

ISIC, the international student identity card for higher education students.

The ISIC card offers more benefits than the student card to Belgian and foreign students, as it also covers travels, some shops, restaurants, insurances, shows and means of transport. To order your ISIC card, you can fill in the [online form available](#) on the website www.isic.be

The European Youth Card

Available for all young people who are under 30 and for one year, this card offers discounts and benefits on various activities and purchases in Belgium and in 35 other European countries. Travels, culture, accommodation, education, etc., it allows you to discover the country in which you study. To get your European Youth Card, register at kiosk.eyca.org/public/kiosk/home

Low prices for train and public transport travels

To enable students to travel around Belgium at a lower cost, the National Railway Company of Belgium (SNCB) offers special prices for students under 26 through different cards. For bus transports, the STIB (in Brussels) and the Tec (in Wallonia) also offer special prices for young people from 12 to 24 years old.

ORGANISING YOUR STAY - ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES



Canadian nationals who would like to stay in Belgium for more than 90 days must submit a long stay visa application to the Consulate General of Belgium in Montreal.

Where and when to apply for a visa

Start by filling out your application form online.

Once it is filled out, print it. Then, assemble all necessary supporting documents and prepare your application package. Do not forget to add your application form, duly dated and signed.

When your application package is ready, send it by post to the Consulate General of Belgium in Montreal (express mail with tracking number, e.g. Xpresspost, FedEx, UPS, DHL or Purolator).

Visa applicants must pay two sets of fees before their application can be admissible: an administrative fee, which must be paid to the Immigration Office in Belgium (the fee), and consular fees, which must be paid to the Consulate General.

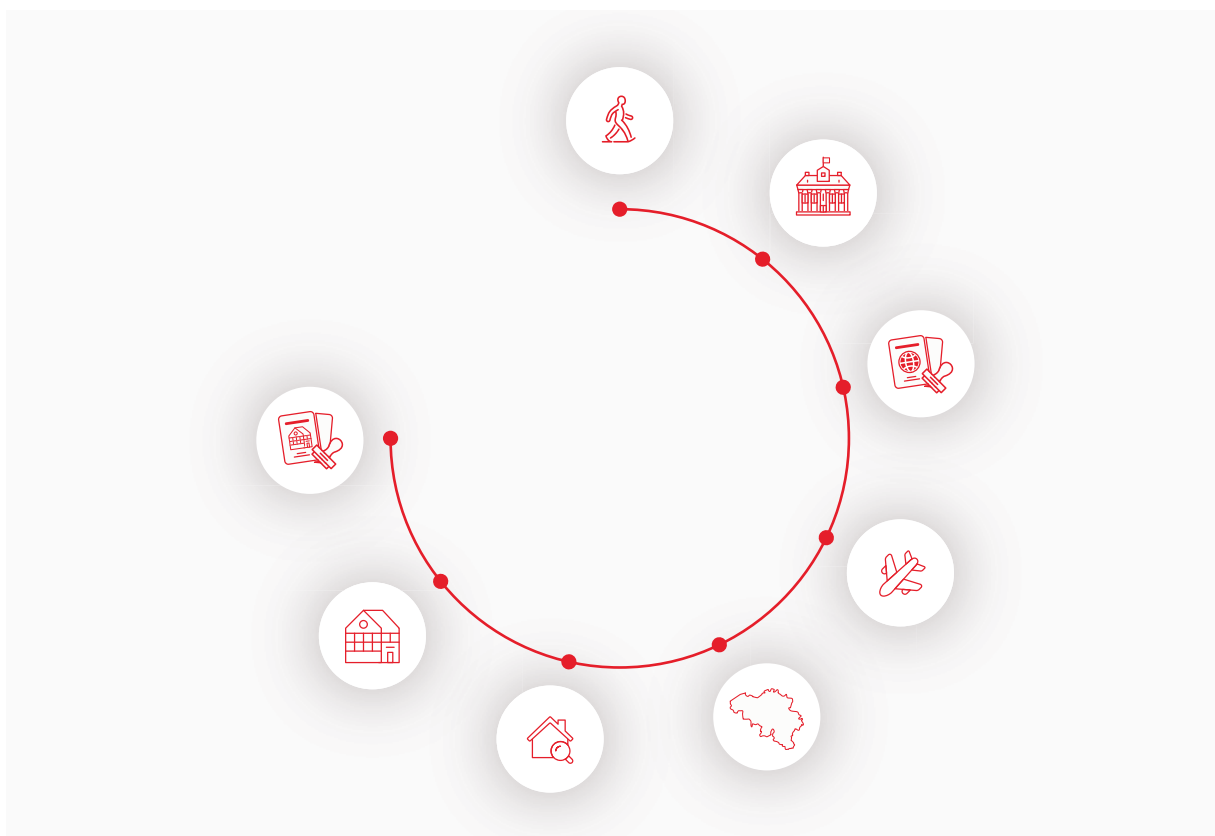


Please note:

- A long stay visa application cannot be submitted more than 6 months before the date of your travel.
- If your application package is incomplete (if you did not provide all necessary supporting documents), your application will not be processed.
- ETIAS (European Travel Information and Authorisation System), the equivalent of the Canadian eTA or the American ESTA, will be implemented in **spring 2025** at the earliest.
- It will affect travellers who are not subject to a Schengen visa (among which Canadian nationals) and who will now need to get a travel authorisation to enter most of European countries.

Applying for a Belgian authorisation for researcher as an international researcher

Since the 1st of March 2023, third-country nationals linked with a hosting agreement to a research organisation recognised in Belgium can benefit from the new legislation regarding the researchers.

To conduct a research activity in Belgium, the third-country national will need an authorisation for researcher.

This authorisation for researcher should be applied for by the recognised research organisation at the competent regional government through the single permit application.

When the recognised research organisation submits this application, the researcher generally has to be in a country outside the EU. Only if the third-country national already has been authorised for a short stay (i.e. maximum of 90 days) or long stay (i.e. more than 90 days) in Belgium, an exception is made, and third-country national may already be on Belgian territory at the time the recognised research organisation applies for the authorisation.

Application for an authorisation to do an internship in Belgium

If you want to do an **internship of more than three months (90 days) in Belgium**, the “**single permit application**” applies to you.

The first step is to get in touch with your future employer in Belgium.

Your employer will then contact the competent authority in Belgium to grant you a “single permit” (= authorization to work + authorization to stay).



Please note that, as part of this procedure, you will need to apply for an apostille or legalise some Canadian documents.

Once the “single permit” is granted (and not before!), you will need to apply for a visa at the Consulate General of Belgium in Montreal.



FOR STAYS OF MORE THAN 3 MONTHS, YOU MUST REGISTER AT THE LOCAL AUTHORITY OF YOUR RESIDENCY PLACE IN BELGIUM WITHIN 8 DAYS OF YOUR ARRIVAL. YOU ALSO MUST UNREGISTER WHEN YOU LEAVE.

You will have to go to the Immigration **Office of the local authority** with the following documents:

- your ID card/passport **and** visa;
- your housing lease agreement;
- an ID photo.

In the following days, the police will pay you a visit at home to check your address. You will then go back to the Immigration Office with the documents required by the local authority to complete the register process, for which the local authority will charge you €18 (±30 CAD).

When the local authority will be done with the registration process, they will send you your Certificate of registration in the Aliens' Register.

HEALTHCARE

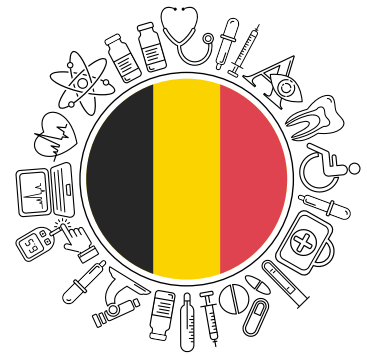
Belgium is considered to have one of the best healthcare systems in Europe.

Students' health: a priority for French-speaking higher education institutions in Belgium.

In the Wallonia-Brussels Federation, all French-speaking higher education institutions pay attention to their students' health and quality of life. This is the reason why universities provide a medical service on campus (general practitioners and specialists). Meanwhile, smaller institutions provide support for students who would like some help in their appointments making, for instance.

In Belgium, it is compulsory to take out an individual health insurance. This includes international students.

⚠ Please note: in most cases, international students must also prove that they are covered by an international health insurance. Moreover, international visitors who stay in Belgium for less than three months cannot join a Belgian medical insurance plan.



Emergencies

In Belgium, you can dial 112 for free, day and night, for the fire department or an ambulance.
For urgent police assistance, dial 101.



WE ENJOY WINTER SPORTS

You like skiing? Enjoy winter sports in the Wallonia-Brussels Federation!

There is something magical about the Fagnes and the Eastern Cantons under the snow. A perfect atmosphere for downhill skiing, walking or snowshoeing in powder snow, with the secret hope of being the first one to leave a trace.

You can enjoy downhill skiing in the Baraque Fraiture, Elsenborn, or Ovifat, which are the most popular sites. Ski lovers also find slopes in Malmedy, Oignies-en-Thierache or Manderfeld.

When the snow is kept waiting, or to prepare for high altitude slopes, head for the indoor slopes, such as the Ice Mountain centre in Comines, with its 9000 m² of real snow.

The RAVeL and the cycle routes

The RAVeL (Réseau Autonome des Voies Lentes) is a comfortable and safe network of greenways, laid out mainly along towpaths and old railway lines. More than 45 signposted local routes allow you to do great walking, cycling and horse-riding trails throughout Wallonia. More than 2000 km to go in order to explore towns and cities, rural areas and nature reserves of Wallonia!

These parks are territories known for their biological and geographical interests and are located in rural areas of Wallonia. The nature Parks reveal outstanding landscapes where nature takes its course and where biodiversity is protected.

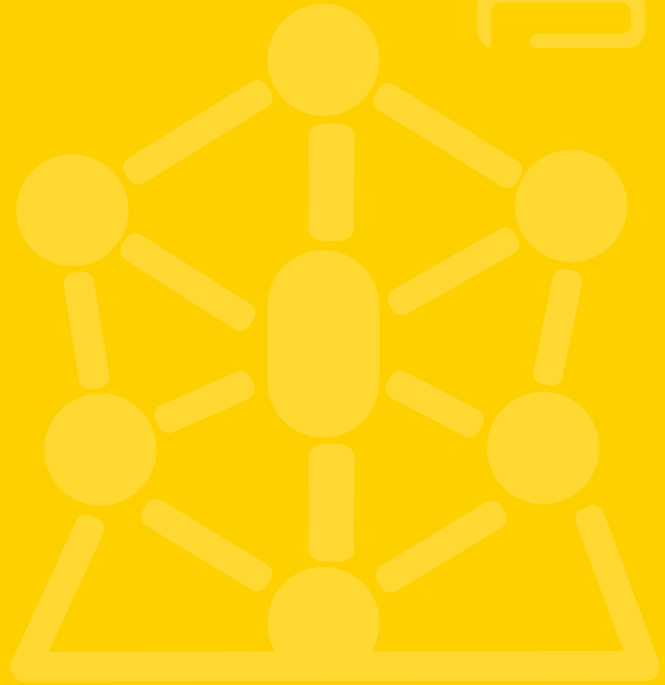
